FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


It's been about four years since we can say we've had a "normal" year. Gratefully, we wrapped up the Rebuild Campaign and opened the Learning Centre in May. While this concluded our capital activities, we then began new operations of a larger facility and the process of re-initiating in house programs. In 2023 we also hired an additional staff member to help fill some gaps that resulted from our growth. This brought us to six full time staff for 2023. Some of the grants we received in 2023 carry on to 2024, so we will have more upcoming related expenses for those.

Rebuild Campaign income for 2023 was \$491,289.74 and expenditures to complete the building were \$823,176.71, and were accounted for separately from the operational budget below (see following page for full Rebuild Campaign budget).

Income - \$814,682.14 (left), and Expenditures - \$512,207.19 (right)




REBUILD CAMPAIGN

Post-Dorian, FRIENDS took on an ambitious campaign to rebuild. The goal was to build a sustainable purpose-built facility that would encompass the growth of the organization and fill some gaps in the community. The campaign officially began in late 2020, picking up pace as recovery progressed on the island and we made it through those difficult early days of the COVID pandemic. This campaign owes its success to our dedicated team and all of you who put your trust in us! Virtual Reef Balls, grants, matching campaigns, individual and business contributions, fundraising dinners and auctions, and the dedication of Learning Centre spaces all helped us meet our goal. With the opening of the Learning Centre in May 2023 we have officially closed the "rebuild phase"! However, we're not done: we are working to help realize the potential of the Learning Centre through its many functional spaces, and have embarked on a campaign to build out the natural history exhibit in the Exploratorium. The Learning Centre Opens: May 11, 2023

After nearly four years of recovery following Hurricane Dorian, the FRIENDS Campus was put back to rights and the Learning Centre formally opened this May. The rebuild project required a great deal of thought and planning as well as an intensive capital campaign. It truly was a community effort, and all who contributed their feedback, time, or funds should be proud!

The Learning Centre is now home to FRIENDS' staff offices and in-house programs. We are also proud to share that our partners at the Bahamas National Trust and Perry Institute for Marine Science are renting office space in the building. We are grateful to have them on site and working with FRIENDS on common goals for conservation in Abaco.

KEYSTONE PROGRAMS

Since our education program began, our goal has been to reach as many students as we can, but also to cultivate relationships with students and guide them in environmental education and ambassadorship throughout their school career, and beyond. Our core in-house programs provide that structure for consistency and build upon past experiences to support and encourage students.


After school clubs ran for 20 weeks this year, reaching an average of 34 students per week between our four clubs: Sea Beans (ages 3-6), Eco-Scouts (ages 7-9), Advanced Eco-Scouts (ages 10-12) and Island Investigators (ages 13-17). Advanced Eco-Scouts was a new addition in September as we wanted to better accommodate the learning styles of the various age groups.





Summer Camps were held in four communities across Abaco, offering seven sessions encompassing activities for ages 3-17. We also hired two summer interns and hosted three teaching assistants who gained valuable leadership experience.

SCHOOL OUTREACH

We guided 636 students on 73 field trips highlighting important ecosystems including mangroves, coral reefs, pine forests and blue holes.

We gave 79 presentations to local and visiting schools, reaching 1,337 students.

CONSERVATION PROJECTS



Our conservation projects are still related to Dorian impacts (and beyond) with a large focus on mangrove restoration through the Northern Bahamas Mangrove Restoration Project and community cleanups, including the Great Elbow Cay Cleanup and International Coastal Cleanup Day.







FRANK KENYON CENTRE

In 2023, the Frank Kenyon Centre housed **355 people** from **17 organisations and institutions.** Kenyon Centre guests contributed time and knowledge to mangrove restoration, stony coral tissue loss disease research, land bird surveys, environmental education, and various community outreach and Dorian recovery projects.


Tell us about your favourite part of camp:
