FINANCIAL OVERVIEW


This year's budget tells a story of progress, where less Dorian repair was undertaken, and the Learning Centre rebuild project was well underway. Our education programs returned in full force and while our staff was still displaced from an office setting general operations were more normalized due to lifting of COVID restrictions and general recovery status of the Abaco community.

We continued a diversified approach to fundraising to ensure sustainability of our programs and continuity for the rebuild project.

PROGRAMS BACK IN ACTION

After school clubs ran for 20 weeks this year, reaching an average of 37 students per week between our three clubs: Sea Beans (ages 3-6), Eco-Scouts (ages 7-11), and Island Investigators (ages 12-17).





We guided 351 students on 52 field trips highlighting important ecosystems including mangroves, coral reefs, pine forests and blue holes.

We gave 19 presentations to local and visiting schools, reaching 233 students.

PROGRAMS BACK IN ACTION

Full Season of Summer Camp!

For the first time since Dorian and COVID we hosted a full six weeks of camps, reaching 114 students across North, Central, and South Abaco!

CONSERVATION PROJECTS





We have continued our partnership with the Ocean Conservancy as cleanup coordinators for Abaco, hosting several cleanups with school groups, communities and summer camps. In one of our biggest cleanups this year, 450 pounds of trash was collected from Winding Bay beach in South Abaco in partnership with The Abaco Club. Due to our limited capacity, we have also developed a cleanup kit designed to encourage individuals to host their own cleanups. This kit includes gloves, trash bags, cleanup sheets and educational talking points to lead a cleanup. Contact us if you'd like to receive more information on this!







DORIAN RECOVERY







We continue to play an active role in environmental recovery after Dorian by being a partner in mangrove restoration and conservation efforts. FRIENDS is conducting mangrove education, hosting a mangrove nursery on our campus, helping to plant mangroves in The Marls, and facilitating a small restoration project at Marnie's Creek on Elbow Cay. Other key partners include Bonefish and Tarpon Trust, The Bahamas National Trust, Perry Institute for Marine Science, Waterkeepers Bahamas, The Nature Conservancy – Bahamas, Bahamas Forestry Unit, and MANG.

DORIAN RECOVERY





In a project focused on improving island sustainability and climate change resilience, FRIENDS installed a 16.6kWp solar and battery energy storage system at Forest Heights Academy in Marsh Harbour. The project included training for teachers, students, and two high school graduate apprentices, and supports FHA's goal to reduce their carbon footprint and reliance on BPL power.

Total Carbon Dioxide emissions avoided equals approximately 24,162kg/year

FRANK KENYON CENTRE



Students and Professors from Bentley University came together with FRIENDS' staff to celebrate the end of a successful course to visit Abaco's ecosystems!

"From Shore to Sea: Understanding Caribbean Ecosystems and their Services". The Kenyon Centre provides accomodation and logistical support to schools, researchers, and service groups visiting Abaco.

In 2022, the Frank Kenyon Centre housed **204 people** from **24 organisations** and institutions, and hosted **three external workshops**, contributing to knowledge and progress in the areas of mangrove restoration, sustainable fisheries, forest management, STEM education, marine debris, sea turtles, stony coral tissue loss disease, Hurricane Dorian recovery, renewable energy and safe water supply.

RISING FROM THE ASHES

This year FRIENDS' campus made the most dramatic transformation we have seen since Hurricane Dorian destroyed our Education Centre in 2019, but this time progress was made in the right direction! From final demolition of the remaining walls of the Education Centre, to ground-breaking, then foundation, walls, and a roof - the new Learning Centre took shape.
